Spotlight on Pupil Voice

As a Church School we passionately believe in the power of pupil voice to aid school improvement and we champion the right of our children to make a positive difference to their school and community. This is underpinned by our school motto: 'What you are is God's gift to you, what you become is your gift to God.'

We firmly believe in our behaviour policy rooted in the Gospel message of John 15:12 'My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you.' makes for a fairer world knowing that living out our faith enables all our children to know that they are truly kingdom builders: 'We are God's handiwork, created in Christ to do good works' from Ephesians 2:10.

We know that listening to and working with our children ensures our school goes from strength to strength as well as enabling our children to help others for as it says in Matthew 25:40 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'

We know that children and young people can offer unique perspectives on what it is like to be a pupil at our school; so involving them in decision-making can create meaningful change and better academic outcomes, as well as facilitating a sense of empowerment and inclusion.

What is Pupil Voice and why is it important?

Pupil voice in schools means a whole-school commitment to listening to the views, wishes and experiences of all children and young people. It means placing value on what children and young people tell school staff about their experiences.

Children and young people need to be provided with meaningful opportunities to share their experiences, views and hopes about their school. Pupils need to know that it is safe and that it is important for them to express their views on what happens at school. They need to know that what they say is valued and will be listened to and considered.

This was a topic discussed before the half-term holiday when we took part in 'Children's Mental Health Week' which had the theme: Your Voice Matters.



We learned about the Convention on the Rights of the Child especially **Article 12: You** have the right to an opinion and for it to **be listened to** and **taken seriously**. More importantly we learned that with rights come responsibilities, for example to be truthful and honest.

Initially they looked at the structure of a school council meeting so that the children had a clear understanding of the task they had as well as specific roles and responsibilities.


Then have since had meetings to discuss the changes they would like to see at school and how children can make these happen.

We really appreciate your involvement in your child's learning journey by listening to them read regularly and recording this in their reading records. The ability to read can never be underestimated and we love rewarding children in Celebration Worship for their efforts!

We have reviewed the way we record children's reading as a whole school staff and we took the opportunity to revise the Reward Scheme at the same time. We will still be rewarding children by the '100 Club' idea however the certificates will reflect a graduated response. We will also be encouraging children with an incentive to join the 100, 200 & 300 Club. Children attaining 400 & 500 will just receive a certificate as by now excellent reading habits will be instrinsically instilled and reading for pleasure will bring its own reward.






Children who have already received their Reading Reward Certificates so far this year will be given the new associated prizes next week.

World Book Day 2024





We will be taking part in this year's World Book Day.
