We teach and promote the Protected Characteristics though our curriculum, through PSHE and through stories. The Equality Act became law in 2010, protecting everyone in Britain from discrimination, harassment and victimisation. Under the Act there are nine characteristics: Age, Disability, Gender Reassignment, Race, Religion or Belief, Marriage or Civil Partnership, Sex, Sexual Orientation, Pregnancy and Maternity. We actively promote these through the curriculum. It is important that all pupils gain an understanding of the world they are growing up in and learn how to live alongside and show respect for a diverse range of people. This document shows some of the story books we use in each year group though it is not an exhaustive list.




Going to the Volcano

LO: To recognise that we are all different




Hair, it's a Family Affair

LO: To work together with different people




Errol's Garden

Explores the possibilities of turning a disused space into a thriving garden for people and nature.




Lost and Found

A funny story linked with themes of friendship and teamwork.



Teaches the children that no matter what your race, ability or family make up, everyone belongs and are accepted regardless.




Malala's Magic Pencil





British values and acceptance. To be accepting of difference.



Deals with issues of behaviour and to know there are consequences for the choices we make.




The Firework Maker's Daughter

Explores themes of injustice, greed, the consequences of broken promises, and the power of music




The Fib and Other Stories

Themes include the importance of trust and bullying. How support is always available.




Charlotte's Web






Rose Blanche

LO: To recognise when someone needs help




How to Heal a Broken Wing




The Girls

How might having dyslexia affect the way someone feels about school and themselves? Why is it important to recognise and support different ways of learning? How can understanding and kindness from others make a difference in someone's life?



The Invention of Hugo Cabret

How might being an orphan affect the way Hugo sees the world and others treat him? Why is it important to support people who feel invisible or left behind? How can creativity and invention help people find purpose and identity?



Journey to the River Sea

What can we learn from people who come from different cultures or live in different parts of the world? How are Maia and the native characters treated differently, and why? Why is it important to challenge stereotypes about gender and race?



Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief

How does Percy's ADHD and dyslexia affect his experience at school and his understanding of the world around him? How does Percy's struggle with dyslexia and ADHD challenge the stereotype of these conditions being "disabilities"?






